



Inclusivity & Antiracism in Parenting Education

Analysis of CCE Statewide Survey data regarding racial group differences in performance

Research Goals

- Holistically observe parenting outcomes by race before and after program participation
- Look at demographic statistics for both participation and survey response and compare to county-wide statistics
- Look at specific programs and counties for positive examples and inform CCE organizations about the findings



Research Methods

- Compare pretest and posttest scores on Statewide Survey questions from 2009 2020 *
 - By county
 - By program
 - By race
- Table: Statewide Survey scores across all programs, counties, and participants

^{*}Note: Questions 2, 3, 5, and 11 have been recoded so that a higher value means a more positive response

Research Results

- At a statewide level, parents generally feel as if they have improved at parenting following enrolling in a CCE program
- The changes are small, yet significant, especially given the range of programs taught by CCEs

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Research Methods

- Observe racial make-up of program participants and compare to county level data
- Table: Comparing the racial breakdown of all CCE participants with the racial composition of NY as a whole

Research Results

- CCE participants seem to be less diverse than NY, but only slightly
- However, this comparison is biased because most CCEs are in largely white counties

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Research Methods

- Observe rates of posttest completion for differences across race *
- Table: Comparing racial identification of those who completed the posttest with those who completed the pretest

American Indian	34	0.61	16	52.9
Asian	122	2.19	53	56.6
Hispanic	634	11.37	345	45.6

Other	79	1.42	38	51.9
Multiracial	155	2.78	74	52.3
Total	5574	100	2919	47.6

Research Results

- Significant posttest incompletion
 - Unsure how related this is to program dropout
- Incompletion seems to happen consistently across all racial groups *
 - Similar trend found across other groups in analysis

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County Level Data

- Provide information to CCE educators about participants who have completed the statewide survey
- Includes information on program scores + demographic information
